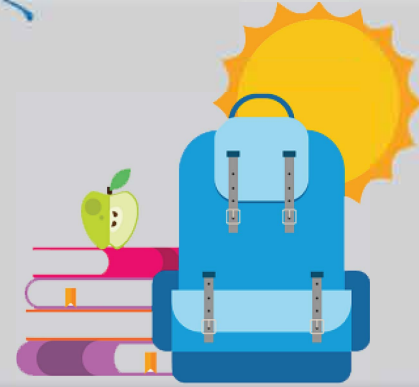

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Elementary school includes kindergarten (junior and senior) and grades 1 to 8. Children usually start school when they are 4 or 5 years old. Some areas have middle school or junior public school for grades 6 or 7 and 8. Secondary school (also called high school) includes grades 9 to 12.

To enrol your children in school for the first time, you need to contact your local school board. The school will assess your children to determine what grade they should be in. There are language supports for students who are learning English.

In Ontario, there are 4 types of public school boards:

- English public schools
- English Catholic schools
- French public schools
- French Catholic schools

FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN

All Ontario public and Catholic schools offer full-day kindergarten for 4- and 5-year-old children (junior and senior).

Some schools also offer before- and after-school programs for kindergarten students.

FRENCH LANGUAGE EDUCATION

FRENCH LANGUAGE INSTRUCTION

There are three types of French instruction in English public and Catholic schools. Contact your local school board to find out which programs are available to students in your area:

- Core French – students study French as a subject.
- Extended French – students study French as a subject, and French is the language of instruction for at least one other subject.
- French Immersion – students study French as a subject and French is the language of instruction for two or more other subjects.

DID YOU KNOW?

FSL or French as a second language instruction is offered in English public and Catholic schools. French is a required subject for most students.

IMPORTANT NOTE

There is no charge for children and teenagers to attend Ontario's public schools. All children between the ages of 6 and 18 must go to school.

SPECIAL NEEDS EDUCATION

Programs are available for children with behavioural, communication, intellectual, or physical needs to allow them to fully benefit from their school experiences. Schools also offer support to students with learning disabilities.
